What: An opinion is a statement that expresses a feeling, belief, or attitude about something. It cannot be proven true or false.

Skill Focus: Opinion

What: It's important to be able to explain our opinions clearly, show respect for others opinions, and think critically about an author's opinion.

How: Look for words like "best," "worst," "amazing," "terrible," or "I believe." Facts remain true regardless of who states them and can be checked by reliable sources. If reasonable people disagree, it is likely an opinion.

Questions to ask your child:

- How can you tell if someone is sharing a fact or telling you what they think?
- If someone disagrees with you about your favorite book, does that make either of you wrong?
- Let's play a game. I'll say something and you tell me if it's a fact or an opinion.
 - The sky is blue.
 - Pizza is the tastiest food.
 - Dogs have four legs.
 - Summer is better than winter.
