# LITERACY SKILLS TOOL KIT

# **SKILL FOCUS: MAIN IDEA**

What: The main idea is the key concept that the author wants to communicate in a text. It's the message that ties together all the details and supporting information.

**Why:** Identifying the main idea helps students understand the purpose of what they're reading, whether it's a paragraph, article, chapter, or entire book.

### How:

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- Distinguishing between important information and minor details
- Recognizing how details relate to the key concept
- Understanding the author's purpose and perspective

# **QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR CHILD:**

### **Fiction Books:**

What is your book mostly about? What is the problem? How does the story end? How does this connect to the problem?

Can you think of one word that fits with this story?

### Non-Fiction Books:

What did you learn after reading these paragraphs/pages? What are three facts that fit together? How do they fit? What do all of those facts have in common? In your own words, what is this about?


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# **QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR CHILD:**
