I feel my pencil Move across the big paper I darken the lines I use the paint for color Now I have a masterpiece




These books are easy to find on OPAC,

St. Patrick's Day Ideas



Both of these colorful desserts use a white cake mix. Start by following the directions on the box and bake according to the instructions for either cupcakes or 9 X 13 cake pan.

If making the cupcakes, ice them using canned frosting and decorate with rainbow colored AirHeads Xtremes, gold covered candy like the chocolate caramels shown, and finish them with colorful sprinkles.

Prepare and bake cake according to package directions, using a greased 13x9-in. baking dish. Cool on a wire rack 1 hour. In a small bowl, dissolve gelatin in boiling water; stir in cold water and set aside.



With a meat fork or wooden skewer, poke holes about 2 in. apart into cooled cake. Slowly pour gelatin over cake. (two 6 oz. packages of lime jello dissolved in one cut of boiling water) Cover and refrigerate.

In a large bowl, whisk 1 cup milk, and one small package instant vanilla pudding. Mix 2 minutes (mixture will be thick). Fold in whipped topping. Spread over cake. Decorate with sprinkles. Cover and refrigerate until serving.
